

Marking 70 Years with Redesigned Headquarters and New Membership Opportunities

ALEXANDRIA, Va. – Founded in 1948, the American Geosciences Institute (AGI) is proud to celebrate its 70th year with the completed, cutting-edge renovation of its Alexandria headquarters, the M. Ray Thomasson Building, and the announcement of new partnership opportunities and membership benefits.

“We have been a proud part of the City of Alexandria for decades, and now we are opening our doors to the community,” said AGI Executive Director Allyson Anderson Book.

Renovation of the building, located at 4220 King Street in Alexandria, was taken as an opportunity to fortify the facility with state-of-the-art technology, essential resources, and collaborative spaces to advance the important work of staff, geoscience professionals, and the broader community.

In August 2018, AGI hosted its first-ever Community Open House to mark its grand opening to both the local Alexandria community and the global geoscience community. The Mayor of Alexandria, Allison Silberberg, and the namesake of AGI’s renovated headquarters, geoscientist M. Ray Thomasson, spoke at the ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Guests marveled at the impressive new space, particularly the thoughtful geoscience concepts in the building’s new design, in which each floor is themed around a different layer of the Earth: the lower level is deep Earth, the first floor represents the crust and biosphere, the second floor evokes hydrologic systems, and the third floor ascends through the atmosphere and into space.

This year, AGI also unveiled a new membership category for trade associations.
